THE PURPOSE OF THE SUBJECT, LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The subject examines the social-psychological and sociological conceptualizations of identity. We look at both individual and group identities, including national, ethnic, religious, gender and sexual identities. We pay special attention to the role of media in the representation and construction of different, primarily minority identities. By studying identity theories students will understand themselves, the micro- and macro-communities they belong to, the society around them better. They develop empathy towards minorities and they will be able to critically examine the role of media in the construction of identites.

SUMMARY OF THE CONTENT OF THE SUBJECT

The subject examines the social-psychological and sociological conceptualizations of identity. We look at both individual and group identities, including national, ethnic, religious, gender and sexual identities. We pay special attention to the role of media in the representation and construction of different, primarily minority identities.

STUDENT'S TASKS AND PLANNED LEARNING ACTIVITIES:

During the classes we shall alternate between teacher's presentations, class discussions, and students' presentations. Active listening and note taking are expected during presentations, active participation (partly based on assigned readings) is required in the class discussions. Each student (individually or in pairs) shall prepare, present and write up a project chosen from a list of topics presented in the first class.

EVALUATION OF THE SUBJECT:

The course ends with a written exam to be taken during the exam period. You may be offered a grade (exemting you from the exam) based on your course work (20%) and project work (80%).

The written exam is based on the course lectures and on the compulsory reading. You have to answer three out of the four questions, writing 2-4 paragraphs about each question. Offered grade can be given: Yes.
